Saturday night will include our annual banquet, installation of officers, and dinner speaker/entertainment. Everyone will be able to depart Sunday morning.

We will essentially have the Field Station to ourselves. It will be easy on your pocketbook with breakfast, lunch, and dinner costing under \$20 per day. ### 2000 Oregon Rare, Threatened and Endangered Plant Conference

he Oregon rare, threatened and endangered plant conference will be held on Friday, June 23rd at the Malheur Field Station, located approximately 30 miles south of Burns, within the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge. The NPSO annual meeting will follow on the next two days, Saturday and Sunday, June 24th-25th. Registration for the T&E conference will be from 8:30-9:00 am; the conference will start at 9:00 am and last until about 5:00 pm. There is a tentative registration fee of \$5.00 per person, which is separate from the registration charges for the NPSO meeting. Any and all people are welcome to attend.

The main purpose of this conference is to update the status of Oregon's

rare vascular plants. using as the starting point the plant list from the 1998 booklet, Rare, Threatened and Endangered Species of Oregon. This list is also available online at www.heritage.tnc.org/nhp/us/or

### Siskiyou Field Institute

The Siskiyou Field Institute (SFI) will offer numerous field courses and workshops for adults and youth from June 16-30. Last year over 350 people participated in SFI programs, which focus on the natural history of the Siskiyous, and the greater Klamath Region. The majority of SFI programs are based out of Cave Junction in the Illinois River Valley.

This year's multi-day programs include the following courses: Trees of the Western Siskiyous, Glorious Graminoids: Sedges, Rushes & Grasses of the Siskiyous, Conservation Biology in the Field, Shrubs of the Siskiyous, Fire Ecology, Forest Ecology of the Klamath Mountains, Geo-ecology of the Klamath-Siskiyou Ecoregion, Recognizing & Keying Plant Families, Nature Writing, Carnivorous Mammals of the Klamath Bioregion, Introduction to Siskiyou Geology, Wilderness First Responder and a Vocational Birdwatching Series. Some of these courses will be available for college credit through Southern Oregon University.

One day workshops include: Serpentine Plant Ecology, Native Seed Collection and Propagation, Botanizing Bolan Peak/Lake, Botanizing the

Crest Trail, Speleology of Caves, Wild Medicine: Ecologically Balanced Medicine Making, Geoecology of Oregon Caves National Monument, Glacial Ecology, Siskiyou Trails: A Natural History, and Salmon Snorkeling.

For youth there will be workshops on ethnobotany, reptiles and amphibians, animal tracking, nature drawing and writing, exploring habitats, and insects.

On June 17, SFI will host a banquet with a keynote presentation on "Ethnobotany of the Siskiyous" by Donn Todt, whose SFI 1999 ethnobotany course received rave reviews from participants. On the evening of June 16, SFI will present talks by Kelpie Wilson on "Biodiversity Mapping in the Klamath-Siskiyou," and Pat Higgins on "How Computer Technology Can Help Save Pacific Salmon." The annual Illinois River Festival, which features educational activities and performances that highlight the natural and cultural history of the region, will take place during SFI on June 24.

There are numerous options for lodging and camping. We have rented the Sis-Q-Meadows Camp on Rough and Ready Creek, where bunk space,

camping and meals will be available. Camping and lodging are also available at local campgrounds and motels.

See dwarf wooly meadow-foam, a rare plant found nowhere else on Earth, along with many other wildflowers in a

unique geological setting. Moderate 3-4 mile hike on good trails. Reservations are required—call Barbara at the USFS (541) 770-2349. Relatively easy 4 mile hike, but some may find the last 500 yards difficult.

## Summer 2000 Internship Opportunities in Native Plant Conservation

This summer the NPSO and Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA) will be jointly sponsoring three internship positions, offered to provide hands-on experience in conserving some of Oregon's rarest and most imperiled native plant species.

Interns will work with staff members of the ODA Plant Conservation Biology Program, and affiliated Oregon State University Department of Botany graduate students, on a variety of conservation projects taking place throughout the state. Some of the potential projects for this summer include:

- hybridization studies and conservation of *Oenothera wolfli*, a threatened southern Oregon beach species;
- reduction of seed predation and research on introgression in Sidalcea nelsoniana, a rare Willamette Valley wildflower;
- conservation of *Pleuropogon* oregonus, Oregon's rarest grass;
- monitoring and recovery efforts for Plagiobothrys hirtus, an endangered wetland plant of the Umpqua drainage;
- re-introduction of *Perideridia ery throrhiza*, a rare southern Oregon native with edible roots;
- mycorrhizal/soil relationships in, and seed collection for, *Astragalus* applegatei, an endangered wild pea of the Klamath Basin.

Internships will last six weeks, beginning in mid-June (exact starting date somewhat negotiable), and will be based out of Oregon State University in Corvallis. Each intern will receive an educational stipend of \$2,500, half provided at the beginning of the summer, and the other half upon completion of the season and submission of a one-page written account of the internship experience for publication in the

NPSO Bulletin. Interns will also receive overnight travel allowances when working out of town. In addition to the monetary stipend, interns will gain experience in the basic principles of study design and data collection, an understanding of issues, techniques, and approaches in conservation biology, training in the use of dichotomous keys, floras, and lab equipment, and familiarization with Oregon's incredible floral diversity.

Positions may require extensive overnight travel, operation of state vehicles, camping, working in remote areas, and potential exposure to harmful animals and plants, and harsh terrain and climate. Desirable internship candidates will possess a sincere interest in, and enthusiasm for, Oregon's native flora and its conservation. Preference will be given to applicants with education and/or experience in biology, and those with demonstrated aspirations to advance their personal development in the field of conservation biology. Internship applications will consist of college transcripts (unofficial copies acceptable), a résumé, two letters of recommendation, and a one-page written essay on how the intern expects to contribute to, and benefit from, the summer conservation biology experience.

Planning has begun for this year's Festival located at the Mt. Pisgah Arboretum just out side of Eugene along the coast fork of the Willamette River. Here is what is organized so far.

The beautiful Bleedingheart, *Dicentra formosa*, will grace the poster announcing the event. This species is a native plant in our area and can be found in low elevation moist woodlands from British Columbia to California. At the Arboretum a large population is in the Watergarden area. It is easy to grow, naturalizes well, and commonly found in nurseries. A more detailed profile of this plant will be available at the Festival.

A special highlight of this year's festival will be the Nursery Section.

Local nurseries will have an exhibit area

and representatives on hand to answer questions about gardening with native plants. A selection of native plants offered by each nursery will be on display. Current efforts are also being made to invite authors of books about gardening with native plants to the Festival. At the very least, a variety of books on native plant gardening will be offered for sale. As usual you can depend on the traditional favorites of the show. The large display of native plant species, an exhibit of poisonous and medicinal plants, the interpretive nature walks, the plant sale, information booths and food booths, entertainment, children's activities and much more.





### New Bulletin Mailing Committee Volunteers Needed
