#### **President:**

Judi Sanders (Corvallis) is originally from the Roseburg area (the descendent of wagon train pioneers to Oregon) and received her Bachelor's degree from the University of Oregon. She did her graduate work in California and spent her career there. After retiring from the Communication Department at Cal Poly Pomona, she returned to Oregon and was drawn to join NPSO by her interest in wildflowers and gardening.

Currently, in her "spare" time, she teaches communication at Oregon State University but also tries to spend as much time as possible in the great outdoors of Oregon. Judi has been chair of the Native Plant Appreciation Week (NPAW) committee the last six years and is looking forward to continuing her leadership contributions to NPSO (particularly getting more people involved with the NPAW "committee"). Judi was recently appointed to the Oregon Invasive Species Council.

### Legislative Committee Update

PSO's legislation to ban the planting of *Arundo donax* in Oregon had its first public hearing. Testimony on HB2813 was heard by the Oregon House Energy and Environment Committee on March 19, at the capitol in Salem. NPSO was supported by Friends of the Columbia River Gorge, The Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation, Portland Audubon Society, WaterWatch Oregon, Trout Unlimited, and individuals who provided supporting comments.

NPSO made the point that under the current Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA) rule, any corporation could commercially exploit *A. donax.* NPSO's Scientific Advisor on *A. donax*, Susan Aldrich-Markham, gave detailed testimony regarding the inevitable escape and spread if this species is planted on a commercial scale.

HB2813 is the only legislative remedy able to rescind the current ODA rule. Portland General Electric (PGE) opposed the bill, as did Oregon Association of Nurseries.

Field trips take place rain or shine, so proper dress and footwear are essential. BRING WATER AND LUNCH. Trips may be strenuous and/or hazardous. Participation is at your own risk. Be prepared to sign a release form indicating this. A sample waiver form is available at http://npsoregon. org/documents/NPSO\_waiver.pdf. Please contact the trip leader or chapter representative about difficulty, distance, and terrain to be expected on field trips. Dogs are not allowed. All NPSO field trips are open to the public at no charge (other than contribution to carpool driver) and newcomers and visitors are always welcome. You must pre-register for all events. National Forests require a Northwest Forest Pass for some field trip locations. Permits can be acquired at forest headquarters and ranger districts.

#### NOTICE TO FIELD TRIP CHAIRS AND LEADERS

The Forest Service and other agencies have set policies limiting group size in many wilderness areas to 12. The reason is to limit human impacts on these fragile areas. You can also visit the website of each NPSO Chapter for a list of resources. This is a good time to visit the OFP Photo Gallery tab to match photos of wildflowers with identification and the OFP Plant Atlas tab to locate where your favorite wildflowers are distributed throughout Oregon so you can plan your wildflower hikes.


