The NPSO board of directors is pursuing ways to work with all minority and under-served groups who are interested in our mission. Plant of the Month: Collinsia tinctoria



Collinsia tinctoria is in the Plantaginaceae and known in Oregon only from Jackson County, in the vicinity of Gold Hill. I refer to it as "frown flower" - look at those flowers! This species is also known from northern California and inhabits dry woods and chaparral. The common names are Sticky Chinese Houses and Tincture Plant - tincture refers to the iodine like sap that stains your hands if you pick the plant. The flowers in the first photo are growing in association with *Asclepias cordifolia* (purple milkweed). The attractive leaves are often mottled (second photo).

OregonFlora



What's happening with OregonFlora?

1. Volume 2 of the *Flora of Oregon* will be going to the printer by the end of the summer. While the floristic treatments for the volume have been complete for a number of months, we have been doing the final work on the front chapters and their related appendices. This 880-page book is packed with information—detailed descriptions of 1,668 species, distribution maps, 782 illustrations, 59 pages of front material with 95 color photographs, thousands of entries in 5 appendices, and an index capturing all instances of scientific

and common names in the treatments. We have worked hard to produce a resource that is accurate, consistent, and elegant and is also a pleasure to use. We will be announcing the ability to pre-order your copy from the publisher as soon as possible.

2. The redesign of the OregonFlora website is still underway. The complexity and comprehensive nature of this project rivals that of the paper publication of three volumes of the *Flora*. It has also involved us working within the Symbiota software development community and contributing new content and design to allow the OregonFlora site to share plant diversity information in ways not available through the provided content. We are currently working with an excellent programmer and graphic designer, and the target date for our public launch is in mid-September. This date is a challenge for our team to accept and undoubtedly a disappointment to many; we appreciate this. It is our hope you trust that the quality and usability of what we are

producing will fully meet your needs for facts and the application of plant diversity data when the site becomes available.

3. The OregonFlora offices, along with the OSU Herbarium, the Dept. of Botany & Plant Pathology and other occupants of Cordley Hall, will be moving in August to temporary housing as the building undergoes a major renovation. With the constraints that Covid-19 has placed on social interactions, our staff has been and will largely continue to work remotely for the foreseeable future. Our contact information remains the same.

4. We appreciate the sustained support and enthusiasm of the NPSO and its membership. Together, we are capturing information about our state's plants and sharing it with all people in an effort to bring awareness, appreciation and enjoyment of Oregon's botanical resources to diverse users. Your help is always valued.
