People come from all over the North American continent to this meeting and describe it as "illuminating and spectacular."

Eriogonums, commonly called buckwheats, are a genus of small flowering shrubs endemic to the arid and alpine regions of western North America. The Society promotes the scientific understanding of Eriogonums and works to protect rare and endangered members of the genus. ## **Oregon Mystery Plant**

#### Last month's mystery plant revealed:

Thanks to all who sent an identification for last month's mystery plant. Jill Kellogg and Gerald D. Carr correctly identified it as *Fillipendula occidentalis*, commonly known as queen of the forest. According to the *OregonFlora* website, this rhizomatous perennial is endemic to northwestern Oregon and southwestern Washington and is found on high elevation coast range peaks and coastal river systems. Kathleen Sayce recalls finding *F*.

occidentalis on Onion Peak: "I was walking with a group of ten or so people. I had just run through the list of rare species we were looking for, and there it was! Not five minutes later we also found a rare dragonfly, whose larvae live in seeps."

## Proposed Delisting of Nelson's Checker-Mallow

The proposed delisting of Nelson's checker-mallow (*Sidalcea nelsoniana*) was announced in the Federal Register on April 28, 2022. The announcement initiated a sixty-day public comment period on the proposed delisting. All relevant information received by June 27, 2022, will be considered. Field Trip: Horse Rock Ridge

Horse Rock Ridge is a three-mile round trip with 1,000 feet of elevation gain, but we won't go all the way to the end as there will be too much to see. The hike follows on old roadbed for seven-tenths of a mile and then opens into a meadow followed by steeper rocky balds with lots of cool flora. We will hike the Iron Mountain-Cone Peak loop, identifying wildflowers in this botanical hotspot. Over 200 species of vascular plants have been recorded across this botanically rich trail west of Santiam Pass. Wildflowers of the Western Cascades (Ross and Chambers, 1988) focuses on the flora of this area. The loop is about five miles through moderately difficult terrain and will take all day

since we will walk slowly looking at all the flowers. There is about a 1,000-foot elevation gain, mostly in the first one-third of the hike. Bring a lunch and water, dress for the weather, and wear sturdy shoes.

Field Trip: High Desert Chapter NPSO Field Trip to the Juniper Hills Preserve of The

Nature Conservancy in Crook County

In 1998, The Oregon Chapter of The Nature Conservancy acquired this 14,000-acre preserve east of Post, Oregon along the Crooked River when it purchased the Alaska-Pacific Ranch. The preserve protects native grasslands, ponderosa pine forests, and juniper woodlands. It has a fascinating geologic history that includes the ancient ecosystems and fossils of the John Day and Clarno times. More recently it was the scene of the Lost Meek Wagon Train in 1845. Wildflowers should be great. We will explore this fascinating history and enjoy the native wildflower display on a four-mile hike (two two-mile hikes to different areas of the Preserve) on relatively level ground. Bring a beverage and lunch to eat on the hike. The trip is limited to ten people.

We will carpool from the east parking lot (near the toilets) of the Pilot Butte State Park on NE Linnea Drive (off U.S. Highway 20), Bend, Oregon. Please arrive a few minutes before 8:30 am to form carpools. We will return to the parking lot by 5:30 pm. Be sure your car's gas tank is full. Bring plenty of water, a sack lunch, a day pack, and sturdy shoes/boots. Dress for the weather. Consider bringing layered clothing, sunscreen, cameras, binoculars, etc. Please- no smoking, no picking or collecting of plants, and no pets. Remember, you participate at your own risk.
