Oregon Mystery Plant

Last month's mystery plant revealed:

According to *Flora of the Pacific Northwest, Potentilla newberryi* (Newberry's cinquefoil) is a short-lived perennial with a slender taproot. *Flora of North America* describes this species' habitat as "moist, sandy to clayey, more or less alkaline soil, especially where seasonally inundated near streams, ponds, and lakes." In central Oregon, it grows in playas where it is inundated in wet years or wet seasons but left "high and dry" in drought years/seasons. It is known from the Columbia River Gorge in Washington and from central Oregon south to northeastern California and northwest Nevada. In regards to the Columbia River Gorge population, *Flora of North America* states: "the only specimen supposedly collected in south-central Washington (W. N. Suksdorf 2718, WTU) was gathered in 1898." It is considered likely extirpated in Washington by the Burke museum and other sources.

OregonFlora's work with volunteers is one of the defining elements of our program. The sharing of time and talent from people statewide is not only a way for our team to interact with the many people we serve, it is also financially essential to our operations. Some of the help we have received from folks includes entering information into databases, sharing of species lists and photographs, organizing fundraising/outreach events, contributing writing and illustrations to the *Flora of Oregon*, editing, and reviewing website content for the Grow Natives tool. The OregonFlora website is the public face to the <u>Oregon State University Herbarium</u>. Curator James Mickley has worked extensively with us to expand the online tools the Herbarium uses to capture and share information from the herbarium specimens. This benefits both programs: herbarium specimen data and images link to the OregonFlora website resources, and our knowledge of plant distribution is expanded by including specimen information in the website's mapping and plant identification tools.

Want to volunteer and help support both OregonFlora and the OSU Herbarium? We now offer an opportunity for people to transcribe herbarium specimen labels. Over 1000 Oregon herbarium specimen images are now available on the community science website *Notes from Nature*. Monday, November 15th, 7:00 pm - 9:00 pm Program: Fire and Weeds: A Growing Threat to Oregon's Native Plant Communities Presenter: Claire Tortorelli

The forests of the Inland Pacific Northwest have historically been resistant to grass invasions and their subsequent ecological impacts. However, a recent annual grass invader, *Ventenata dubia*, commonly known as ventenata, has rapidly spread throughout forest mosaic ecosystems of the inland northwest where it threatens to alter fuels and fire behavior. Our speaker Claire Tortorelli, a National Science Foundation graduate research fellow at Oregon State University, will explore the factors that drive the ventenata invasion and examine how the invasion impacts native plant communities and fire. The location of this program will be announced at a later date, but, considering COVID restrictions, may be offered virtually through a link to be provided on our website.

Description: What makes the Trinity Ultramafic Sheet in NW California special floristically? Thursday, November 18, 7:00 pm - 8:00 pm Virtual Presentation: Native Plant Programs of the Marion Soil and Water Conservation District Presenter: Jenny Meisel

Join Jenny Meisel, Native and Invasive Plant Specialist at the Marion Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD), to learn how the Marion SWCD promotes the use of native plants in urban and rural areas in Marion County. Jenny will discuss the SWCD's education and restoration programs to help landowners identify native and invasive plants on their properties, plan native plant projects, control invasive weeds, protect riparian areas, and create wildlife and pollinator habitat. In addition, she will discuss Marion SWCD's efforts to help landowners restore properties impacted by the Beachie Creek and Lionshead fires.

Jenny coordinates the Marion SWCD's Native and Invasive Plants programs, Annual Native Plant Sale, and Scholarship Fundraiser. Jenny also works with partner agencies to conduct invasive plant surveys and to implement control projects within Marion County. Jenny earned a Master of Science in Wildlife Science from Oregon State University and a Bachelor of Science in Biology from the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire. She joined the Marion SWCD in 2008.
