# **Oregon Mystery Plant**

#### Last month's mystery plant revealed:

The June Mystery Plant was a familiar one to many and generated some interesting discussion! Ken Chambers, Phil Hays, Bruce Waugh, Daniel Mathews, Frank Callahan, Dave Dobak, and Gerald D. Carr all correctly identified it as *Cladothamnus* pyroliflorus (Elliottia pyroliflora), known commonly as copper bush. According to the *OregonFlora* website, this shrub, which is in the family Ericaceae, is found in montane coniferous forests in Oregon, Washington, and Alaska. It is relatively rare in Oregon, known only from the Coast Range in the northwestern corner of the state.

Ken Chambers, author of "Floristic Relationships of Onion Peak with Saddle Mountain, Clatsop County, Oregon" (Madrono 22: 105-114, 1973), commented that copper bush is also found on Onion Peak, the site of our June 2022 Mystery Plant. He pointed out there has been an attempt to tie *Cladothamnus* to the morphologically quite different Eastern U.S. genus *Elliottia*, relying simply on DNA evidence.

Ken said: "In the treatment of Ericaceae in Flora of Oregon, Volume II, *Cladothamnus* is recognized as a genus distinct from *Elliottia* and *Tripetaleia*, but in some other books, the three genera are lumped under the oldest name *Elliottia*. If you lay specimens of *Cladothamnus* and *Elliottia* side by side, you'd never guess they were related, the inflorescences are so different. There is a third member of this generic triplet, *Tripetaleia*, in Eastern Asia, proving that their evolutionary divergence goes back at least to the Miocene Epoch, 5+ million years ago."

Dave Dobak referred to copper bush as a "taxonomic nomad," citing its various scientific names over time and place: *Elliottia pyroliflora*, *Cladothamnus pyroliflorus*, and *Leiophyllum pyroliflorum*, as well as its taxonomic relationships to *Elliottia* and *Tripetaleia*.

Meet at 9:00 am at the Wilkinson parking lot across from the Beanery. From the parking lot, the drive to the top of Fairview Peak is forty miles.

As an ecotone that connects western and southern Oregon floras, Fairview Peak has some of the most diverse botanizing in the central Cascades, all accessible by car. This trip will sample the variety by making a series of stops with short walks along the road on the way to the nearly 6,000-foot summit. Only experienced drivers in high clearance vehicles (such as a Subaru Forester or similar) in good condition should attempt this rough, steep, and occasionally scary one lane road. Due to very limited parking, carpooling will be required.

The rewards for the risk are a beautiful drive up the Brice Creek drainage, a stop in the forest on the way up to look for achlorophyllous plants, stunning meadows and rock gardens near the top with a flora that includes east side and southern species, and views from Mt. Hood to Mt. McLoughlin on a clear day. A plant list is available at https://westerncascades.com. Go to Sites, Lane County, and then Fairview Peak and Bohemia Mountain. It is an all-day trip so bring lunch, water, and sunscreen.

Hike the John Dellenback Trail and see what the Siuslaw National Forest is up to with dunes restoration. This area is a "preserve the best" unit, meaning it has an abundance of native dunes plants - adapted to open sand conditions reminiscent of historic dunes conditions before the planting and expansion of European beachgrass, brooms, and other invasive species. We'll see seashore bluegrass, sand fescue, and bearberry plant associations among other native dunes species. The sand boundary was treated during late summer 2020 by cutting and wiping Scotch broom, spraying European beachgrass, and cutting small shorepines. Meet at South Eugene High School (19th and Patterson Street) at 8:00 am to carpool or at Dellenback Trail parking lot (just south of Eel Creek Campground, ~ eleven miles south of Highway 101 and Highway 38 junctions in Reedsport) at 10:30 am. The hike will be approximately three miles round trip (it is an out and back trail). Sand dunes hiking can be strenuous, windy, and chilly. Bring water, lunch, and sun coverage.
