

NPSO State Secretary Kim Brown Awarded the Botanical Society of America 2025 Service and Advocacy Grant



Kim Brown, NPSO State Secretary and Portland Chapter member, won the Botanical Society of America's Advocacy and Service Grant for her proposal on creating accessible and educational native plant gardens.

Every year Kim organizes a community "bike-planting" event in Portland called the Beecycle. Beecycle seeks to boost native plant knowledge amongst the community and increase people-plant connection by utilizing spaces that urban residents see and use every day - street strips. Street strips are the greenspaces along roads, ubiquitous in the urban environment, and have been overlooked for their potential to serve as interactive and educational spaces for native plants. Each year Kim chooses two to three homeowners to assist in transitioning their street strip to native plants, prioritizing homeowners from marginalized communities. With the help of enthusiastic bicyclist volunteers, the group transports and plants hundreds of native plants over the course of

a day. After planting, the volunteers install a sign with a QR code so that people passing by can scan and learn about the plant species, their growing requirements, and their environmental benefits.

## Save the Date! 2026 NPSO Annual Meeting May 29 to 31

Mark your calendar! The Willamette Valley Chapter is delighted to host the next NPSO statewide Annual Meeting May 29-31, 2026, at the Willamette Heritage Center in Salem, Oregon.

## Schedule Overview:

- Friday, May 29: Participants will be able to choose from six self-guided field trip options and attend a no-host dinner at <u>Lively Station</u> or another selected Salem-area restaurant. Attendees should bring a sack lunch and water.
- Saturday, May 30: There will be thirteen half- and full-day guided field trip
  options throughout the mid-Willamette Valley, Cascade foothills, and Oregon
  Coast, as well as two workshops and several presentations at the Willamette
  Heritage Center (see highlights, below). Lunch and dinner will be included.
- Sunday, May 31: The six self-guided field trip options will repeat on Sunday and



participants are welcome to round out the Annual Meeting activities at a no-host brunch at Magnolia on the Green or another selected Salem-area restaurant. The NPSO state Board of Directors will meet at Pringle Community Hall in Salem on Sunday from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm.

### **Annual Meeting Highlights:**

- A keynote presentation with Greg Archuleta, cultural educator and member of the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde, on Indigenous uses of Willamette Valley native plants.
- A two-part guided wildflower hike along the North Fork of Silver Creek at Silver Falls State Park and at a vernally wet meadow adjacent to the park with Oregon State Parks Interpretive Ranger Matt Palmquist.
- A native plant pressing workshop using microwave-friendly plant presses with James Anello, cultural educator and member of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians.
- A presentation with Rose Grimson, Environmental Science major at Willamette
  University and recipient of a Jean Davis Memorial Scholarship, about her work to
  measure and map soil health and native plant populations at natural areas
  stewarded by the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde.
- A tour of Willamette University at Zena, a 305-acre natural area owned by the
  university that supports academic research and environmental education and
  serves as a "living laboratory" for sustainability practices, with Director Weston
  Miller.

A comprehensive list of activities with descriptions and plant lists, as well as registration costs and lodging options will be shared with NPSO members in the coming months.

Registration for the meeting will open in Spring 2026 on a first-come, first-served basis. Attendance is limited to the first 150 members who register. Look for more information regarding registration and Annual Meeting activities in the *Bulletin* in February.

## Call for Field Trip Assistants:

The Willamette Valley Chapter is seeking volunteers to assist our field trip leaders during the guided field trips on Saturday, May 30. Field trip assistant responsibilities include:

## Before the trip:

- Communicate with your leader to clarify responsibilities. (The leader or a WV Chapter member will contact you.)
- 2. At the meeting place, hold a lollipop sign advertising the trip.
- 3. Keep a list of participants (this will be emailed to the leader in advance and provided to you at the group meeting site) and check them off as they arrive.
- 4. Have participants sign waivers, if this hasn't been done.
- 5. Help organize carpools at the meeting site, if needed.
- 6. Distribute hard copies of the driving directions, plant list, and other helpful information (to be provided by the Willamette Valley Chapter).
- 7. Make sure that all trip participants have cell phone numbers for you and the trip leader.

## During the trip:

- 1. Take a headcount at the trailhead or parking area at the field trip site before the trip/tour begins.
- 2. Serve as a "sweeper" (bring up the rear) and make sure everyone remains accounted for.
- 3. Help ensure participants do not stray from the group or go off trail without the trip leader's permission.
- 4. Carry a first aid kit (to be provided by the Willamette Valley Chapter) and make it available for use by the participants as needed.
- 5. Take a headcount at the trailhead or parking area at the field trip site after the trip/tour ends and before the participants depart.
- 6. Be a timekeeper and monitor the time so the trip is completed, and participants are back at the meeting venue by 4:00 pm.

Based in Salem, the Willamette Valley Chapter is one of eleven chapters comprising the Native Plant Society of Oregon. Our chapter, like the others, is dedicated to the enjoyment, conservation, and study of Oregon's native plants and habitats.


Willamette Valley Chapter activities serve NPSO members residing in Salem, Marion County, and parts of Polk County. This region includes important botanical destinations such as Kingston Prairie, Silver Falls State Park, and Baskett Slough National Wildlife Refuge. However, our field trips are wide ranging, from the High Cascades and Columbia Gorge to the Oregon Coast.

Established in 1977, the Willamette Valley Chapter also organizes outreach activities at regional events, habitat restoration volunteer opportunities, and a lecture series. In addition, the chapter administers two scholarship funds for sophomore, junior, and senior students enrolled at an Oregon college or university and majoring in botany, ecology, conservation biology, horticulture, landscape architecture, or other plant-related fields: the <u>Jean Davis Memorial Scholarship Fund</u> and the <u>Augusta Rockafellar Memorial Scholarship Fund</u>.

## Portland State University Herbarium and Rae Selling Berry Seed Bank Open House



OregonFlora has had numerous changes and challenges this year, and as we move into autumn, we are settling into our new circumstances with optimism.

Staffing: Taxonomic director Stephen Meyers stepped away from his position early this year. During his fourteen years of service, he developed the Contributors' Guide for the *Flora of Oregon*, interacted with floristic contributors, guided taxonomic decisions, and authored countless treatments in all volumes of the *Flora*. We are grateful for how he helped shape our program.



Much of our team has worked together for decades and consider one another friends as well as colleagues. Thus, we all deeply feel the pain of challenges that several of our staff members have faced this year in their personal lives. We continue to give support as these folks return to their OregonFlora roles.

This spring, we bid farewell to our software programmer, Eric Samelson. His work of the past year—with assistance from James Mickley, Oregon State University Herbarium curator—included security enhancements and upgrades to the operating systems and server configurations for our website.

And... we have new team members bringing expertise and energy to OregonFlora! Ash Gill joins us as taxonomic editor, Joie Beasley-Bennett as an editor and herbarium liaison, and graduate student Brian Phan as website developer. We are also grateful for the committed assistance of numerous volunteers, most recently Richard Halse, Steve Broich, Cree Foeller, and Matthew Sundberg. So many people have assisted OregonFlora through the years; we appreciate you all!

**Funding and partnerships:** Our quest for ongoing state legislative support did not pass this biennium; we will try again in the next session to get a funding bill passed.

In these tumultuous political times, we are fortunate to not have lost our federal grants, which make up approximately 25% of our operating budget. However, they both expire in 2026, and our agency contacts report that future funding opportunities do not look promising.

What do all these transitions mean for our program, and completion of the *Flora of Oregon*?

- We anticipate sending Volume 3 of the Flora of Oregon to the printer in 2026, probably toward the end of the year.
- We continue to look to charitable donations and foundation grants for financial support.

Your participation and your support have seen us through challenges, both now and in the past. It is this engagement that makes OregonFlora the valued and freely accessible program that it is.

Doing impactful work that benefits the places and the biodiversity we cherish is an antidote to the strife that is flooding our society; let's continue - together - to make a positive difference in our knowledge and appreciation of the plant life of Oregon.

## **Oregon Mystery Plant**

## Last Month's Mystery Plant Revealed

Thanks to all who responded to last month's mystery plant. Karl Anderson, Roger Brewer, Alana Pass, khcritters, and David Predeek all correctly identified it as *Chamaenerion latifolium*, dwarf fireweed. This species will be addressed in Volume 3 of *Flora of Oregon*. In *Flora of the Pacific Northwest*, *Second Edition*, it is one of only two species in the genus *Chamaeneron*, the other being *C. angustifolium*, great willow herb or fireweed. The less common dwarf fireweed is a rhizomatous perennial and a "colonist on damp river gravel, seeps, and scree in montane to alpine meadows and rocky slopes."

Both species are described as "showy but unruly in a garden."

All entries should be sent to <a href="mailto:photosnpaw@gmail.com">photosnpaw@gmail.com</a> and must be received by December 31, 2025. Photos will be evaluated by the poster committee based on subject matter,

composition, and technical quality. The poster designer reserves the right to exclude an image if it doesn't fit the overall design or if it's deemed unsuitable for the poster.

If selected, photographers must be able to provide a high-resolution version of their image (at least 300 dpi) and preferably an unedited file. By submitting your photo, you consent to NPSO's use of the image - free of charge - on our poster, website, social media, and related publicity materials.

Presentation: After the dams: Plant community recruitment in the Klamath reservoirs

The removal of four dams on the Klamath River marks one of the largest river restoration projects ever conducted. The drained reservoirs - over 2,000 acres of bare ground - will change rapidly as plants come into this space, both through intentional seeding and planting of native species and unassisted spread of native and nonnative species common in our region. Our research group at Southern Oregon University worked in collaboration with the Yurok Tribe's Revegetation and Monitoring Branch to study plant community response in seeded and unseeded sections of the reservoirs. We present our observations of establishment patterns in the years immediately following dam removal, with a particular focus on the recruitment of willows and oaks, both species of high ecological and cultural importance.

Chhaya Werner, Ph.D., is an Assistant Professor of Ecology in the department of Environmental Science, Policy and Sustainability at SOU. Her doctoral work at the University of California Davis examined the impacts of fire, drought, and priority effects on plant communities, and was advised by Dr. Truman Young and Dr. Susan Harrison. Her postdoctoral research included developing methods to quantify species interactions in diverse communities, applied to patterns of coexistence in California grasslands. Her current research focuses on mechanisms underpinning plant community dynamics in fire-dependent systems, mountain meadows, and the Klamath reservoirs.

The Coos Bay District, Bureau of Land Management, needs help collecting seed from pink sand-verbena on the North Spit of Coos Bay. Pink sand- verbena (*Abronia umbellata* ssp. *breviflora*) is listed by the Oregon Department of Agriculture as endangered. The population of pink sand- verbena on the Coos Bay North Spit is the largest known population in Oregon and currently the only population large enough to provide significant quantities of seed for restoration of the species.
